### MARCH UNITS

This month the children will be finishing up Transportation Units. We hope that all families are faithfully buckling their child in the back seat in order to keep all our friends safe. We believe it's important to introduce the children to the world of work through the next unit, *Community Helpers*. **Parents, you are sincerely invited to participate by visiting the classroom to talk about your occupation (or a related one).** We suggest that parents bring "hands on" items to pass around or show to make the experiences more concrete for young children. For example; painter: paintbrushes and rollers; accountant: adding machine with tape and office supplies; nurse/doctor: stethoscope and flashlight, etc. **If you can participate, please arrange a day and time with your child's teacher.** Throughout the month, we will provide opportunities for the children to try on different roles from the world of work through dramatic play. We will also turn our house corners into post offices, grocery stores, a hair salon, hospital, etc.

**We are seeking empty food cartons, junk mail, dress up items, etc. that you might be able to send in to replenish some of the dramatic play materials for the Dramatic Play/Imagination Centers located in each classroom. Please save these items for us! Bring them in any time!**

### Have You Checked The Bulletin Boards Lately?

Did you know that *every day* you can find out all the details about what the teachers have planned for your child? All you need to do is go to the classroom bulletin board that says "Parent Information". Your child's *Daily Schedule* is posted there as well as the *Weekly Lesson Plans* with all the activities that will occur each day. You can find out what's for breakfast in the morning or afternoon snack, what to help your child select for Show and Tell on Friday, and what story teachers will be reading to the children each day. ### **From Childcare Information Exchange**

Recent research on the impact of violence on children in their early years should prompt a call to action for all citizens." This stirring charge came from Kevin J. Swick and Nancy K. Freeman in their article, "Nurturing Peaceful Children to Create a Caring World: The Role of Families and Communities," in **Childhood Education** (Fall 2004; [www.acei.org/cehp.htm](http://www.acei.org/cehp.htm)). In this article, the authors talk about how adults serve as important role models on how to love and how to care. They share four elements identified by Pearl Oliner in children's early relations that enhance their growth toward becoming caring persons...

**"Bonding:** forming positive connections and establishing a sense of communion with others.

**"Empathizing:** understanding others' feelings and emotions, sometimes even feeling what they feel.

**"Learning caring norms:** acquiring rules and values, learning to recognize caring for what it is, and to respond to care with care.

**"Practicing care and assuming personal responsibility:** participating in activities and developing a sense of personal obligation for doing so."

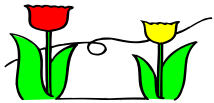
### **Judy Hoyer Grant and Extra Curricular Programs!**

We are so fortunate to have so many enriching programs that our children get exposure to at Greenbelt Children's Center! Our Spanish language program, club Espanol, is enjoyed by all children. The music instruction from Mckinney's Music Program and physical education program of Funtastic Fitness programs are much loved!. All classrooms enjoy the WolfTrap Artist in Residency program that focuses on drama and literacy-what a fun and educational program! The benefits of the Judy Hoyer grant also include the Lending Library, Book Club Events, technical assistance, and classroom computer support as well as Parent-Teacher training. We believe that the grant funding will continue next year, also.



### **LOOKING AHEAD . . . THINK SUMMER!**

Be sure to start thinking about your summer schedules because you will definitely want your child to enjoy the special opportunities we are planning for them at our Summer Camp Program this year! We have been busy working on our Summer Activity Calendar, we have



some wonderful special events planned including some of the favorites that the children enjoyed so much last year! The Summer Camp Calendar will be available soon! Children attending the Camp Program can look forward to swimming at the pool, musical entertainment, drama, science programs, and pony rides - just to name a few!!

We *anticipate* Summer Camp to begin on June 21st and continue for 9 or 10 weeks until August 26<sup>th</sup>. A schedule form for your child will be sent home soon so that you will be able to reserve a space, **before** we offer spaces to the general public. It is very important to work on your summer plans now; we anticipate great demand and long waiting lists, as has occurred in the past.

Look for the **Summer and Fall Intention letter** that will be sent home with your child. This form will be due back to the office in early **April**. It will have information about next school year's calendar and fees. Parents will need to complete the intention form for the upcoming summer and fall program at Greenbelt Children's Center regarding your child's continued enrollment. (**Summer schedules will be due by May 3rd.**) A transition plan for next year will be developed for each child as soon as parents notify the GCC office of their child's plans for the coming year. It is important that teachers help each child to transition to the next classroom situation so that the child will feel secure and confident and know what to expect for the next assignment. **Parents who commit to our fall 2010-11 program by submitting their NON-REFUNDABLE materials fee by April 16, 2010, will have tuition held at the current tuition prices:** Rm 2 \$205 per week/ Rm 1 & 3 (pre-k or alternate K programs) at \$185 per week (reminder Rm 1 pre-k expects a 40% grant subsidy to reduce tuition for the 42 weeks of the school year.) and \$145 per week for Before & After Care for Grades 1st-3rd. If you miss the deadline, tuition will increase as per published rates.

**Alternative Kindergarten Experience:** Parents of children **turning five by September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2010** should see Ms. Johnson or Ms. Jill about alternate Kindergarten options for the fall in **Room 3's classroom** at Greenbelt Children's Center. *We hope that there will be strong, continued support for the **alternate Kindergarten program at Greenbelt Children's Center.** The benefits for your child include the smaller class size, two teachers for more individualized attention, child care to cover your entire work day, a calendar with more days open, research based curriculum that is approved by the MD State Department of Education and an excellent four star NAEYC accredited early childhood program. These are very important things to consider as you make your choice for the fall. The value of our alternative kindergarten experience is exceptional. Please consider giving your child this gift the year before starting the first grade at public or private school.*

We expect to continue our **partnership with Prince George's County Public School for the Pre-k Public School Program that is here at Greenbelt Children's Center.** The age of entry requirement to enter Pre-K is: "turning four years old by September 1st, 2010.

### **Worthy Wage Day**

Worthy Wage Day is held on May 1<sup>st</sup> of each year to draw attention to the inadequate compensation of Early Childhood Professionals. In a publication, "Staff Turnover in Child Care Centers: Maryland 2006" by Maryland Committee for Children, it was reported that "Only 18 occupations out of 770 surveyed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in 2003 reported having lower mean wages than child care workers. Those who earned higher wages than child care workers included service station attendants, bicycle repairers, and locker room attendants." The problem is pervasive in the field and the result is



a major factor affecting the recruitment and retention of high-quality childcare professionals. This is linked to serious consequences that could adversely affect young children in care, as a result of high turnover of childcare staff. There is a saying that goes “Parents can’t afford to pay; teachers can’t afford to stay, let’s take action for a better way! Turnover is a detriment that everyone in our society needs to consider. Even if your child is getting a wonderful pre-school education in an accredited center with low turnover, when s/he gets to higher grades, will the other children in class be well prepared and ready to learn? When your business needs to hire workers, will they be prepared, reliable, and able to function successfully? What about the children who are not nurtured and cared for properly? Research shows that this affects many things later in life, such as high school drop out rates, teen pregnancy, incarceration rates, drug use, and crime rates. ***Each child needs to have the best possible beginning and it is the responsibility of all citizens, businesses and levels of government to make circumstances good for all children.***



The children at GCC are fortunate. We have very little staff/teacher turnover, partly because we work so hard at retaining the good teachers who are here. ***It has been a tradition for parents to do something special to show appreciation for our staff at GCC on a Friday in May, date to be announced. If you would like to be on a parent committee or chair the committee, to plan something special to show appreciation for our hard working teachers and assistants, please let Mrs. Gee know.***

### **Policy Reminders!**

Keeping children healthy needs to be everyone’s goal. Please do not send your child who has awakened with a fever to school if you have given Tylenol or Motrin. This just masks the symptoms until the fever returns; **meanwhile the ill child has just exposed all the healthy children and teachers to the contagious illness.** Remember to keep your child at home until symptom-free for 24 hours, before returning to school. Only send your child when your child is well enough to participate in all scheduled activities, including going outside to play.

Also remember to check your child’s extra clothes. Are they weather appropriate? Did you include extra socks and shoes in case a puddle is encountered? Rain boots are always

welcome! Help your child enjoy the outdoors this spring.

Also, remember that a serving for a young child 2-5 years is: **¼ cup vegetable** or **½ cup fruit, one ounce of protein, ½ cup of rice, cereal, etc.** We sometimes see portions that are much too large packed in children's lunches. Please do remember to send in 2 fruits and/or vegetables each day for every lunch! **Also, remember to make GCC a nut free haven to protect the lives of our seriously allergic children.**



### **School Picture Day**

On Wednesday, March 10<sup>th</sup>, the photographer from LifeTouch will be here to photograph the children for school and class group portraits. Be sure to fill out the form in advance of this day. The forms will be sent home via Art Folders today and we will need your form back with the information and your permission required. Children who are photographed will receive a special child identification card that could be used in the case of a missing child.

### **Protecting Our Children**

April is Child Abuse Awareness Month, both in the state of Maryland and throughout the country. As child care providers, we are required by law to report any suspicions to the local Protective Services Office. Teachers are trained to pick up on early warning signals that a child is at risk and all staff members in a NAEYC accredited program are expected to do what they can to help prevent child abuse. GCC also has free supports for any family that may be dealing with any difficult family issues such as divorce, death in the family, separation, step parenting and blended family issues, etc. Each family may access the family social worker of the Early Childhood Consultative Services of Bowie Therapeutic Nursery that GCC subscribes to on behalf of all families here.
